

Back in the first century, Shavuot was a day of great celebration. Jews came from all over the world to the Temple, to offer the best of their first fruits or crops to God, of which, wheat which was considered the finest grain. This is why this feast is also called the First fruits of the Wheat Harvest (Exodus 34:22). And this wheat came to symbolize the believer who is the firstfruit.

When Yeshua gave the Parable of the Wheat and the Tares, He compared the true believers with the wheat thus recalling this great harvest of Pentecost. In this parable, He was prophesising the kingdom to come and there He says that He is the One who sows the good seed of the wheat in His field (Mat.13:24) and He is the One who tends to the wheat and at the end, He gathers it into His barn (vs.30).

In Hebrew, the word for wheat is nɨṇ (ḥiṭṭâ) from the root word hanat meaning to mature, to grow, because the grains grow from the ears of the wheat and then ripen. Wheat then was a symbol of the believer who is always maturing to greater and greater spiritual heights.

So Israel was compared to wheat. In the Book of Song of Songs, the writer who symbolizes God as a bridegroom, writes about his wife to be, Israel, and says,

Your belly is like a heap of wheat fenced about with roses7:2b.

This is something that one would not say to his wife today. She will surely misinterpret it, unless she understands that wheat is considered such a rich grain, and how Israel is seen as being rich and flourishing and surrounded by beautiful roses.

The Wheat was also seen as fulfilling the image of the whole Temple, which was built on its threshing floor.

And so at Shavuot, they will heap the great quantity of wheat offered by the people in the treasuries at the Temple. This is compared with Yeshua who will gather His wheat in His barn at the end. This is God who saw the remnant of Israel as a heap, as a rich and full mound of wheat which He also gathers into His treasury at the end.


