

On October 7th, Jews around the world were set to commemorate Simchat Torah (The Joy of Torah), a day typically marked by dancing, singing and celebrations, because the annual reading of the Torah (the Five Books of Moses) would have come to its yearly end. As we read and reread our Scriptures year by year, we draw closer to understanding how important it is to reexamine our lives, our motives and our relationship with the Lord and with each other.

Charity has always been a foundation, or pillar in the Jewish mindset, an act that results in unity of community, and bringing a quality of greater fairness to the world.

The modern word for charity in Hebrew is *Tsedakah*, but it is based on the biblical understanding of acts of righteousness, fairness or justice. For example, in Leviticus 23:22 we read: *When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not wholly reap the corners of your field when you reap, nor shall you gather any gleaning from your harvest. You shall leave them for the poor and for the stranger: I am the LORD your God.'"*

Though we are thankful for the harvest, we are obligated by law to remember the poor and needy. As God remembers us in our needs, so we are to do the same for others. Notice that although there was an obligation to leave the edges of your field open for the poor to glean, how much of the edge was never detailed. We would then see not only the obligation to give, but also the heart's determination in how much to give. Charity then is based on personal responsibility and to some degree a free will offering. How important is charity in Israel? There are over 500 non-profit charities listed through Israel's department of Justice.

We want our donors to know where the monies have been going. We have had the privilege to donate for the most part, your funds toward food, clothing and shelter to those in need (families that have been searched and found to have suffered consequences of the war).

We have also given to Israel through: **Netivyah, OneforIsrael** and the **Joshua Fund**

We are looking to allocate funds to the following three charitable organizations: Support for IDF Widows & Orphans Organization **IDFWO**OneFamily which provides emotional support to victims of terror and war.

We also want to acknowledge a messianic organization that helps the mother keep her unborn child, and which helps mothers and families with financial and emotional counselling. Speaking to the head of **Be'ad Chaim**, we have learnt that over 1500 families were helped with diapers, clothing and other needs since the war broke out.

Please note that 100 percent of the donations sent in were distributed (no percentage kept by Beth Ariel Congregation).

We stand together with Israel. May the Lord continue to protect and provide through His unwavering promises.


